Celebrating 50 years of Christingle





On Sunday 2nd Dec All Saints hosted a special service to mark 50 years of Christingle. Christingles originate from Moravia and mean 'Christ-light'.

A Christingle tells the story of the Christian faith. The orange represents the world made by God. The cocktail sticks represent the four seasons and are covered in dried fruit and sweets to represent all of God's creation and provision. The red ribbon around the orange reminds us that God sent his son Jesus to rescue us from sin because he loves us and wants to know us. Finally, the candle in the middle reminds us that Jesus is light to the whole world, bringing hope to those who live in darkness.

Fifty years ago, The Children's Society adopted Christingle and now encourages churches nationally to host a special service to raise awareness of, and funds for their work with vulnerable children and young people.

At All Saints we shared a wonderful service of songs, prayers, a short video and a 'panto style' talk all focussed on the Christingle. The church was filled with pictures of Christingles decorated by local children from Denmead Infant and our Messy Church and Little Stars groups. At the end of the service came the special moment when we lit our own Christingles and thanked God for sending Jesus as light to our world. A collection was taken, and we raised £282.99 for The Children's Society. Thank you to all who came and joined with us and all those who gave so generously.

Florence Owusu



Florence Owusu lives in Ghana – she sells top-up cards for mobile phones, from a wooden kiosk next to a busy road and her income is 15p for each top-up sold......She is 41 years old, married with 5 children to support. 3 years ago she was hit by a motorcyclist as she crossed that busy road.

When we met her in May last year, she had one crutch to hobble around on – her very deformed leg was obviously still broken and her eyes showed the intense pain she was living with. She had never gone to hospital after the accident – she could not

afford to and she was frightened of hospitals!

As a group, we prayed for her and decided we would like to help her. With the help and counselling of Fr Christian and Dorothy (the secretary at our link church of St Pauls), she finally went to hospital. She was assessed and the orthopaedic surgeon at St Joseph's thought it was possible to break and then reset the leg bones. Florence although frightened, agreed to go through with the operation. It would cost around £300 initially, her family and Dorothy would take all her food to

her and a further payment afterwards "depending on the number of plates used".

Through generous donations amounting to £500, the cost of all her treatment and food were covered.

She is now home, but still using crutches. She is due to have her review soon so we are all

hoping and praying that all will be well.

Why Do You Go?

Every three months or so there is a "Taizé Service" in All Saints'Church. We asked Lesley Hallett to tell us more....



Could you tell me about the Taizé Service, and why you like to go to it?

I really love this service. For me, it has all the components to concentrate the mind: Prayer, Readings, moments of silence and music.

How would you describe the music?

David leads the service and he always explains, to anyone who hasn't been before, how the format evolves – and we have a "sing through" of the music to the chants.

We are blessed with a small group of musicians who variously play the piano, guitar, viola, flute, oboe and sometimes cor anglais.

The chants are simple, memorable and repetitive. This brings the experience of prayer to a different level, combining the sound of prayer in the voice with music. Because it is repetitive, the mind can be totally focused on the words.

What else happens during the service?

David brings the service together round a definitive idea depending on the Church calendar. It is based around readings from Scripture and there are usually two periods of silence when you are able to reflect without distractions.

How many people normally go to it?

There is a nucleus of 15 to 20 regulars. It is a wonderful way of

forgetting about the world for an hour and concentrating on Worship.

David has arranged the following dates for the next Taizé services — and be assured of a warm welcome if you decide to come...

Sunday, 6pm on December 30, March 31, June 16



Taizé is a small village in Burgundy where, soon after the end of the Second World War, a young French Protestant pastor called Roger Schutz-Marsauche set up a religious community with a small group of friends.

From the start, one of the principal aims of the community was to pray and work for reconciliation, and Taizé is unique inasmuch as the Brothers represent all the main Christian denominations. From its modest beginnings, the community has grown steadily, and attracts large numbers of visitors each year, especially young people.

Taizé worship is based around readings from Scripture, periods of silence, and simple but beautiful chants, which are sung repeatedly so that they become prayers in themselves. Our Taizé services at Denmead follow this same pattern and are usually held when there is a 5th Sunday in the month.

Have you found a painted rock in Denmead?




