
is, the greatest day in history. And Easter opens an invitation to each of us; an invitation to get to know God, to become connected to God in a lifelong journey and adventure.

Lesley Rose, Advice Services Manager at Citizens Advice Winchester District offers advice on how to tackle damp issues with a private landlord.

 I live in a privately rented two-bedroom house and the damp in the living room is aggravating my three-year-old daughter's asthma. I've told my landlord but she's not taking action. What can I do?

Resolving damp issues can be difficult - especially as the cause of the problem is not always obvious. Also, by raising any disrepair complaint to a private landlord it's important to realise that there is a risk of retaliatory eviction.

First, make sure you're not doing anything that could be contributing to the damp, such as drying clothes indoors or blocking vents. Once that's done, you have two potential routes available

The first is to report the problem to the Environmental Health department at your local authority. This route is best if you're unsure what's causing the damp, but it's also an option if you think your landlord is responsible.

Tell your council the damp is causing your daughter's asthma to worsen and provide evidence, including letters from your GP, photos of the damp, and a copy of your tenancy agreement.

The local authority can issue an awareness notice, which tells your landlord there's a hazard in the home and what she needs to do to fix it. although it does not require her to take action. The authority can also serve the more serious improvement notice, which requires your landlord to carry out the work and also offers you some protection from retaliatory eviction.

Alternatively, you could take her to court. Your landlord may be held responsible for repairing the damp but this will depend on



the cause - such as a broken heater or window - and the terms of your tenancy agreement.

If she is responsible, the court can grant an injunction and possibly award compensation. Seek advice from us before going down this route because the legal process can be complex. You may also be entitled to legal aid.

Denmead Horticultural Society

'Weeds – Can We Ever Win?' was the subject of Alick Jones talk in March. We have all heard the definition that a weed is a plant growing in the wrong place and many can be appreciated as beautiful or useful. The problem comes when they compete with the plants that we want to grow and their many strategies for survival make them difficult to control. Ground elder is attractive and the leaves can be eaten as spinach but like bindweed, docks, brambles and celandines it is their persistent roots that cause the problem - they can re-grow from the tiniest fragment and roots have been found growing 30ft down in a chalk pit.

Other weeds spread rapidly by seed. Bittercress can complete two or three cycles of growth from seed to flowering plant in a year producing up to 1200 seeds per plant distributed by explosive pods. Thistle, dandelion and rosebay willowherb seed is dispersed by the wind. Burdock and herb bennet seeds have hooks which attach to fur or clothing and were the inspiration for Velcro. Birds distribute the seeds of berries such as mistletoe, elder and

rowan in their droppings and we transport seeds in the mud on our boots. Poppy seeds can survive in the soil for 80 years and are stimulated into growth by exposure to light as happened in the Flanders fields leading them to become our symbol of remembrance.

Some plants which defend themselves with toxins such as in the stinging hairs of nettles, giant hogweed sap which causes painful blisters and the attractive red berries of wild arum are all undesirable in the garden. Removing weeds before they set seed and using groundcover plants or mulches to shade them out can help. The popularity of wild flower seed mixes has made some weeds fashionable and vellow rattle which reduces the vigour of grasses is now planted to reduce mowing. Alick was an informative and entertaining speaker and his talk ended with pictures of attractive wild flowers that could be safely welcomed into the garden.

By contrast Rosemary Legrand's talk on 3rd April titled 'Bhutan, Kingdom of Rare Plants' will introduce us to more exotic plants and scenery. As a former nursery owner and

currently a lecturer and tour guide she is well qualified to show us what this part of the world has to offer. Visitors (£2) and new members welcome, 7.30pm in the Church Hall.

Our Spring Show is on Saturday 7th April in the Church Hall, open from Ipm. We are looking forward to the displays of spring flowers, vegetables, crafts and baking so do come along to enjoy it and stop for tea and cake. Hampshire County Council

Helping Hampshire's Local Charities

Across Hampshire there are over 6000 registered charities and many more local groups who offer vital community support to residents across our County - but where do these groups go when they need help? A new resource has been established - the Hampshire Council for Voluntary Service Network is an alliance of 10 local organisations who work together to provide development services and the specialist skills needed for local groups to grow and meet the challenges facing their local communities.

In a recent survey of their members, over 50% reported an increase in demand for their help from Hampshire residents. Similarly, many charities also report that it is becoming harder to find people who are able to volunteer their time and talents to help. In response, the Hampshire CVS Network has launched a new website that is designed to help local charities and community groups connect with network partners to provide clear and easy access to the skills and resources they need. The site provides access to information on Hampshire's volunteering development services, information on training available across the county and a toolbox of resources for groups and charities that covers everything from transparent and effective governance to raising vital funds to carry out their work. Preferred Choice Secondary School

Of the parents applying for a September 2018, Year 7 place at a Hampshire secondary school, 98 per cent have been offered a school of their choice - with more children (over 92 per cent) being allocated a place at their preferred first choice school. The County Council received 13,981 on-time applications this year, up by 428 from last year.

Pupils who did not secure a place at one of their chosen schools have been allocated a place at a school near to where they live, with available spaces. Parents have the right to appeal in these situations and their child's name will be added to the waiting list for their preferred schools. Places do become available if parents change their mind, or families move home. The admissions team is now busy processing primary school applications with offers due to go out to parents on 16 April 2018.

Young Musicians

Did you know that Hampshire Music Service supports more than 60 ensembles, orchestras and choirs across the County for young people aged between 5 and 19 years? There are groups for all levels, from beginners trying out instruments, to advanced musicians looking for more challenging material and performance opportunities. The Hampshire Youth Orchestra are preparing for their next big performance, at the Royal Albert Hall in April, in front of an audience of 2,000 people.

Recycling Plastic

For a number of years the County Council has worked through various local government networks to lobby and influence central government and the supply chain to re-think the types and amounts of plastics that are used in packaging. Recent publicity [the Chinese government's decision to stop accepting waste plastic and paper from the UK] has been helpful in raising the priority of this issue, leading to its inclusion in the recently published Defra 25 year Environment Plan. The County Council is leading on a project for the HIOWLGA Board that is looking to develop a business case for a new Super MRF that would be able to accept and separate a wider range of plastics than at present. In time, this will lead to an increase in the range of accepted plastics in the kerbside collections carried out by district and borough partners.

Funding for Hampshire's Athletes

Hampshire's most promising athletes have been awarded funding by Hampshire County Council to help them on their journey to sporting success. This year, 191 sportsmen and women have been picked for the Hampshire Talented Athletes Scheme (HTAS), funded by the County Council and managed by Energise Me. Of the 191 athletes awarded support this year, 119 will receive grant funding worth a total of £40,825. The scheme provides athletes with grants for competition and travel costs, physiotherapy and sport science support, free access to leisure centres and bus travel, plus public speaking training to inspire children during school visits. Two former HTAS athletes include Winter Olympic 2018 skeleton racer Gold Medalist, Lizzy Yarnold and alpine skier Laurie Taylor.
