It's coming home?!

ear Friends, As I write this letter the English football team have just won against Sweden in the quarter finals of the World Cup. As I went to bed Saturday night, with windows wide open to offset the effects of the relentless summer heatwave, the distant call of England football fans could be heard shouting "it's coming home, it's coming home!"

The refrain "it's coming home" is taken from the 1996 No1 single Three Lions, penned by the Lightning Seeds and comedians Frank Skinner and David Baddiel. The refrain originally was a reference to the fact that England was hosting its first major football tournament since the 1966 World Cup. The refrain has evolved to refer to the hope and expectation that one day the World Cup trophy will return to its birth home England. "It's coming home" embodies a deep desire; it is a rallying cry, that unifies and draws young and old together.

Much of the nation is now gripped by football fever; England's feats in Russia have led to wild celebrations, frenzied headlines and countless memes. My favourite

meme is a picture of manager Gareth Southgate outside IKEA carrying a box with the words 'trophy cabinet' written on it! Even those with just a vague football interest are now all pondering could we, might we, bring it home - is this our time?

Well of course only time will tell. On Weds 11th England will play their first World Cup semi-final in 28 years and then after that – well who knows? The World Cup Final is set for Sunday 15th July at 4pm, which is also the time when at All Saints Church, 13 candidates will be reaffirming promises made at their baptism to follow Jesus



and place their trust in God as Bishop Christopher confirms them. It will be an exciting afternoon in many ways.

And of course, by the time you read this article we will all know - did the trophy make it home? Or have our hopes been shattered?

It is this phrase, "it's coming home" which has really grabbed my attention; for in my mind's eye I can see God shouting this to us – but rather it's not

an unfriendly, impersonal '*it's*' but rather it is by name, ''Joshua's coming home'', ''Suzanne's coming home'', ''David's coming home'', ''Laura's coming home'' - you get the idea.

In the Bible Jesus told the story of a Lost Son (it can be found in the gospel of Luke, chapter 15). The Son rejects his Father, wishing him dead, take his share of his inheritance and travels far from home. The Son makes several stupid mistakes, blows all his money and ends up rejected and bruised. Meanwhile despite the son's hurtful actions, the Father remains devoted to his Son. The Father waits, he hopes, he longs for the day when his Son will come home. Then, one day the Son comes to his senses, realising he cannot live without his Father's love, he humbly returns home. On his arrival his Father is so delighted that he throws a massive celebratory party and rejoices that this child of his, who once was lost, is now safely home again, back in relationship with him.

Jesus told this story to illustrate the love God has for each of us. The Father in this story is God, and we are like the lost son, lost children, who for one reason or another, have wandered far from home. But God loves each of us and longs that we would return home and know his love and care in our lives. Each of us is precious to God, a trophy of great worth and God longs to welcome us home.

If you would like to find out more about this idea of returning home to God, can I encourage you to come and try the Denmead Alpha course this Autumn. Alpha is a series of interactive sessions that freely explore the basics of the Christian faith. Each session begins with a meal, followed by a talk which considers a different



question around faith and is designed to create conversation. There is plenty of opportunity to discuss, ask questions and share view points in a small group.

Denmead Alpha is open for everyone whether you're new to the Christian faith, been attending church a long time, or just exploring and questioning. There is no pressure, no follow-up and no charge.

lan Alexander Ruthven-Stuart M.B. Ch.B., D.Obst.R.C.O.G. (1927-2018)

On one day in April 1974 one of the most auspicious events of my life took place.

I had recently seen an advertisement in what was "The Tower of the Winds" at the Radcliffe Infirmary, Oxford (Now Green College) for a vacancy in a general practice three man partnership in Denmead and Hambledon, in Hampshire.

I applied for the job and Diana and I were duly invited for interview. Diana was eight months pregnant with our eldest daughter, Caroline and we arrived in Hambledon, in a campervan together with a nearly two year old son, Huw. ...there was never so much as a moment when I did not enjoy working with Ian

Joining a GP partnership is rather like getting married without a courtship, so as you can imagine, my wife and I were a little apprehensive.All our anxieties were rapidly dispelled by the very warm welcome we received from Ian, Christina, Nicolas, Sarah, David and two adorable seven year old twins, Peter and Sophie. Ian immediately struck me as the amiable, trustworthy, senior partner for whom I was looking. He clearly was a man of the highest intellect and one sensed at once that here was someone very special.

My first impressions proved to be entirely accurate and I cannot to this day believe my luck in joining him at the practice. I can honestly say that from that day in November 1974 there was never so much as a moment when I did not enjoy working with Ian.

> Not only did we work together but we made time to play squash together as he soon introduced me to the incumbent of East Hoe Manor.

Within a year or two a new invention appeared. – the sailboard or to give it its brand name, the Windsurfer. Ian and I soon each acquired one of these and would go windsurfing on the Solent - Exhilarating fun until once when I was on duty, Ian went off on his own.

This was the first time we nearly lost him as the combination of outgoing tide and fatigue resulted in his being swept towards the English Channel.Fortunately the RNLI came to his rescue and brought him safely home. Despite the stresses of general practice, lan always maintained his calm and composure. He would

routinely walk into the surgery, whistling the theme tune of Dr Finlay's Casebook, cluck his tongue twice and one knew that all was well with the world.

lan had boundless energy. He would run several miles every morning with his Labrador dogs and eventually, when he had worn out his knees, he took to mountain biking. He was always extremely fit – that is, until the second time we nearly lost him. In 1987 he developed a serious abdominal tumour.

Without any fuss, he referred himself to a surgical colleague who wisely advised him to go to one of our best surgeons at Basingstoke. I recall visiting him in hospital and asked him what was the worst aspect of the whole ordeal. He replied, "The cheap perfume worn by the night nurses!"

He very soon came back to work despite the severe after-effects of the operation. He always regarded work as therapeutic and I don't remember him ever taking time off for minor ailments. He was a supreme example to his patients, though few could match his resolve. In the practice he wisely believed in having personal lists of patients understanding the importance of knowing a manageable number of them well. All his patients respected him and many adored him.

lan was greatly missed when he retired in 1993 but I enjoyed seeing him often in the

village, driving his dumper truck or dressed up in a yellow jacket and sou'wester raising money for the R.N.L.I., his, and Christina's favourite charity.



Soon after retiring, lan volunteered as medical officer for The Sail Training Association on a transatlantic venture with a crew of young cadets. On the return voyage he had to care for a seriously ill patient who was vomiting continuously with severe abdominal pain and in danger of dehydration. In the circumstances he was unable to set up an IV infusion so he simply laid the patient on the deck and ensured that he sipped fluids. Fortunately the patient survived and was able to tell me the tale on his return from hospital when he arrived back in England - for that patient was himself. That was the third time we nearly lost lan.



Geoff Hawkins' talk on Herbaceous Borders began with a potted history of garden styles from Roman times to the present day and mentioned many famous gardeners and their contribution to garden design including William Robinson's mixed borders and naturalistic planting, Gertrude Jekyll's use of colour, Vita Sackville West's garden rooms at Sissinghurst, Alan Bloom's island beds, Beth Chatto's gravel garden demonstrating her principle of 'right plant right place' and Piet Oudolf's prairie planting.

Hints for a successful border included edging with a brick or stone path so plants flopping over the edge don't hinder grass mowing, don't cut plants down till spring as stems and seedheads can look attractive in winter and provide food and shelter for birds and beneficial insects, don't overfeed as this will produce lush growth that needs staking, repeat colours and group plants using odd numbers and include different shapes, forms and textures. Geoff showed us many pictures of gardens with beautiful borders that made us want to visit including Waterperry, the mirror image borders at Bramdean House, the centenary border at the Hillier gardens and the new long borders at Kew.

We don't have a talk this month but are back on 4th September to learn about Pickles and Chutneys.

Lesley Rose, Advice Services Manager at Citizens Advice Winchester District advises how to check if a property rental is as good as it seems.

- I've seen a new property advertised which I'd like to rent and am thinking about putting a holding deposit down. However, the rent is really cheap - should I be worried it's a scam?
- A You're right to be cautious if the rent is a lot cheaper than the market rate. Don't be hurried into paying a deposit before you view the property and look at your tenancy agreement.

Viewing the property is important - not least so that you can see if it's as advertised. If the landlord refuses, or is evasive, take this as a possible warning sign they are not legitimate. Even if you have seen the property, it's still important to check your tenancy agreement carefully.

You should expect your tenancy agreement to give the name and address of the landlord, along with their contact details. Ask for this information to be added if it's not already included. If no contract is provided, or information on your landlord is missing, this is another red flag that the letting could be a scam.

Finally, it's a good idea to see if the landlord is a member of a professional landlord association or is accredited by the local council. Membership isn't compulsory, but it will mean they are legitimate and will operate to a minimum standard.

Robots on the Verges

Hampshire Highways teams are trialling new robotic grass cutters as the annual grass cutting programme gets underway. Grass cutting is an important part of HCC annual highways maintenance programme as good visibility is vital for all those using the road to maintain clear lines of sight. The robotic cutters use smart technology to navigate easily around obstacles and pre-set boundaries. This means they can be used in areas where traffic travels at higher speeds and where it would be more dangerous for workers to operate.

Hampshire County Council manages around 5,500 miles of road and 2,000 miles of roadside verges. Grass and foliage is cut once a year on rural roads with swathes cut back to one or two metres depending on location, and urban verges are cut more often. Outside of this, grass and foliage will be cut back where it may cause a safety risk because of reduced visibility. Hampshire Highways take extra care to manage over 200 Roadside Verges of Ecological Importance in Hampshire.

Sustaining local Services

Hampshire County Council is considering its future spending priorities and how best to meet an £80 million budget gap by 2021/22, arising from continuing demographic pressures, as well as inflation

and Government grant reductions. As well as meeting all statutory duties, the County Council will continue to do everything possible to address the issues we know people care most about – from supporting the most vulnerable adults and children, to fixing Hampshire's extensive road network. We will seek to bridge the budget gap through a combination of careful investment, further innovation, and greater collaboration with partners and communities. By investing in the latest technology, the County Council is providing more responsive and efficient services. For example, recently launching the world's first trial with tech giant Amazon to adapt Alexa to help vulnerable people live more independently; and now using robotic grass cutters to keep roadside verges under control.

Public Transport Subsidies

Hampshire County Council is asking for residents' and stakeholders' views in a public consultation on options for applying budget reductions in subsidies for public transport and in street lighting. This follows the "Shaping Hampshire: Balancing the Budget" public consultation in 2017 which identified residents' priorities. Our priority is to direct resources to where they are most needed and the County Council's Cabinet agreed earlier this year to protect the community transport service which provides vital support for elderly and disabled residents.

For some time, the County Council has been working with Hampshire's bus operators to discuss how, between us, we can reduce the impact of our budget pressures on supporting bus travel. Bus use in Hampshire is close to a 20 year high, and the vast majority of journeys are made on commercial services operating without any public subsidy at all. However, even though 89% of bus services in Hampshire run without public subsidy, the pressure on the County Council's revenue budget means we can no longer afford the level of subsidies we have provided in the past. Therefore, the County Council is seeking to make savings by making changes to financial support for public transport services. Feedback from passengers will be looked at carefully, alongside data on passenger journeys and the cost of providing individual routes or services to inform final recommendations for consideration in the Autumn.

Community Transport schemes, such as Dial-a-Ride, Call and Go, Taxishares and Minibus Group Hire Schemes are not included in these proposals but people will be asked whether the discretionary discount for holders of older persons' bus passes on community transport should be continued. The County Council is also asking residents their views on proposals to switch off some street lights for two or more hours during the night. This would mean that some areas of the County would have no street lighting for a period of the night time.
